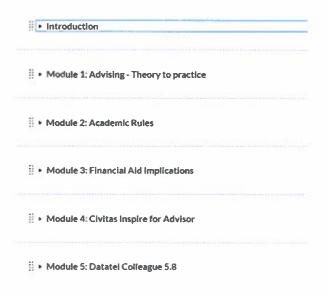

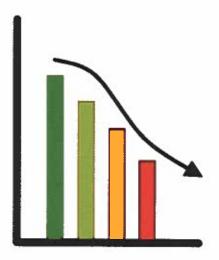

# Regent's Report

## Texas Commission on Community College Finance: Final Recommendations

#### 1. State Funding for Outcomes

\$430M

**Recommendation 1.1:** Develop a modern community college finance model that distributes the majority of state funding based on **measurable outcomes** aligned with regional and state workforce needs and state goals for *Building a Talent Strong Texas*.

This new outcomes-based formula should be dynamic, with adjustments through an annual settle-up process. Funding levels should be based on individual colleges' current outcomes with specified fixed dollar amounts for:

- · Credentials of value, including degrees, certificates, and other credentials from credit and non-credit programs that equip Texas students for continued learning and greater earnings in the state economy;
- Credentials of value awarded in high-demand fields;
- Students who transfer to four-year universities; and
- Students who complete a sequence of dual credit courses that apply towards academic and workforce program requirements.

**Recommendation 1.2:** Ensure community colleges across Texas can access foundational levels of funding for **instruction and operations** through a state-funded guaranteed yield for colleges with low taxable valuations.



#### 2. Affordability for Students

\$170M

**Recommendation 2.1:** Increase funding for **Texas Educational Opportunity Grants** (TEOG) and link state performance measures for eligible students served through TEOG at two-year institutions and TEXAS Grants at universities to establish a state goal of supporting at least 70 percent of qualified low-income college students in pursuing postsecondary credentials of value at public two- and four-year institutions. The TEOG program should also be restructured to provide colleges greater flexibility in meeting the needs of non-traditional students pursuing a wide variety of credentials of value, including non-credit and short-term programs.

**Recommendation 2.2:** Provide financial aid through colleges to cover tuition and required fees in dual credit courses for economically disadvantaged students. This new targeted **financial aid for dual credit** should be administered by THECB, with support from the Texas Education Agency (TEA), for dual credit courses that apply towards academic or workforce education program requirements. It should also incorporate a maximum tuition rate for dual credit courses set annually by THECB to help ensure equitable access for high school students across the state to dual credit courses.

#### 2. Affordability for Students

**Recommendation 2.3:** Expand partnerships among colleges and private employers for **paid work-based learning** opportunities, including work-study, apprenticeships, and internships related to students' programs of study, utilizing the work-based learning strategic framework developed by the Governor's Tri-Agency Workforce Initiative. Work-based learning is a proven strategy to provide financial support while giving students opportunities to apply and develop skills through real work experiences in industry settings. The state should leverage existing federal funding and provide targeted state support for programs developed in partnership with employers and offered through colleges to expand paid work-based learning.

#### 3. Investments in College Capacity

\$50M

**Recommendation 3.1:** Provide one-time **seed grants for programs in high-demand fields** to support community colleges in rapidly standing up or expanding programs to meet regional and state workforce needs. These grants would be administered through THECB in consultation with the Texas Workforce Commission. Drawing on insights from initial implementation of the Texas Reskilling and Upskilling through Education (TRUE) program, the state should give priority to short-term workforce programs developed in partnership with employers.

**Recommendation 3.2:** Support and facilitate **shared services** and stronger inter-institutional partnerships. THECB should facilitate shared services to enable individual colleges to improve operational efficiency and expand the range of academic and workforce programs they offer. These shared services might include support for inter-institutional partnerships, master service agreements, and state technology infrastructure, along with related feasibility studies. For example, institutions across the state should be able to leverage other institutions' online courses so students can stack courses, credits, and credentials to earn degrees, certificates, and short-term workforce credentials that smaller colleges would be unable to offer on their own.

#### 3. Investments in College Capacity

**Recommendation 3.3:** Update state policies, and build upon the recent work by individual colleges, to help community colleges across the state provide high-quality non-credit credential programs that are **convertible and stackable** with credit-bearing programs. A state crosswalk of non-credit to credit courses and programs will improve transferability of workforce education courses across institutions and throughout students' pathways, from high school dual credit programs through pathways for adult learners to support ongoing reskilling, upskilling, and career advancement. This state crosswalk could also facilitate and improve the mobility of credit awarded for students' prior work experience. Projects already underway through the Governor's Tri-agency Workforce Initiative to clarify and streamline career pathways should be considered in these specifications of stackable credentials.

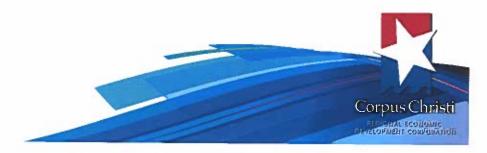

## Biennium Funding by Contact Hours for the Base Year

 Texas Legislature funds community colleges on a base year during periods beginning the summer semester of the even numbered years prior to a legislative session.

2014-2015; 2016-2017; 2018-2019; 2020-2021; 2022-2023

- The base year begins in the Summer I semester and continues through the end of the following spring semester.
- Funding is calculated on certified contact hours earned during a semester.
- Contact hours are based on the total number of hours of instruction for each student and for each course that is taken.
- The census date for counting contact hours varies depending upon the variety of enrollment periods during a semester such as:

16 weeks, 15 weeks, 8 weeks, Rapid Track, Maymester, etc.



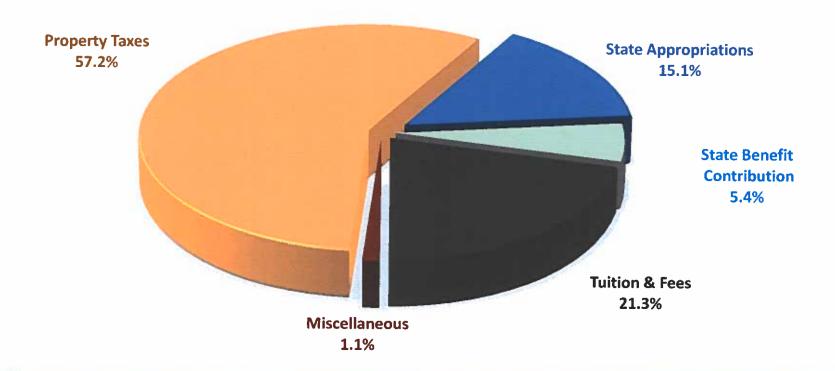

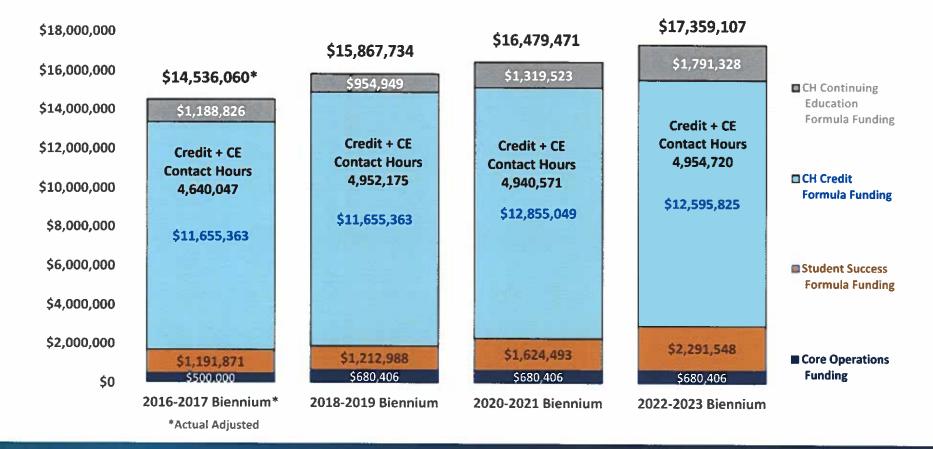


## Budget Revenue 2022-2023 \$114,706,068

## **Community College Formula Funding**

Since 2014, community college formula funding has consisted of three major components. Contact hour funding reflects enrollment and allocates funds based on each institution's proportion of the statewide total of weighted contact hours. Student Success Points funding allocates funds among institutions based on their performance on certain defined student success metrics. Core operations funding provides an equal amount to each community college district to help cover basic operating costs.

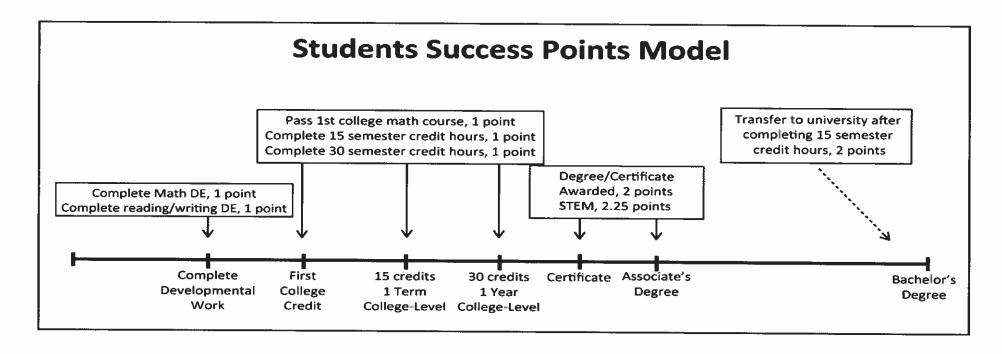

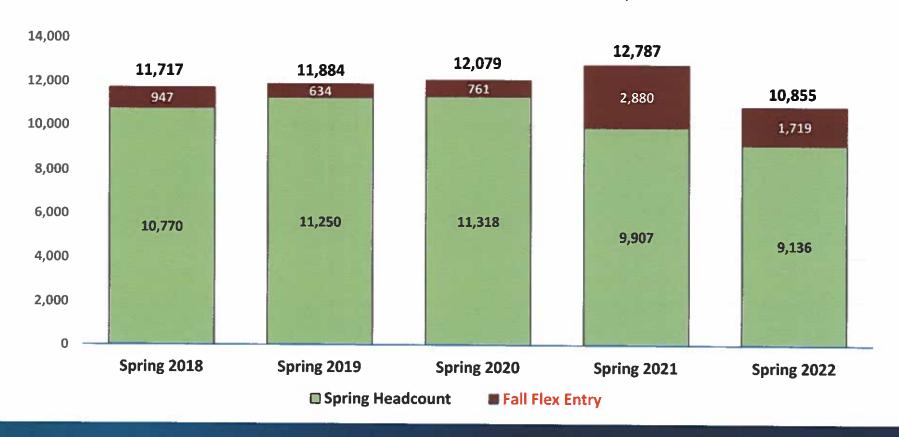

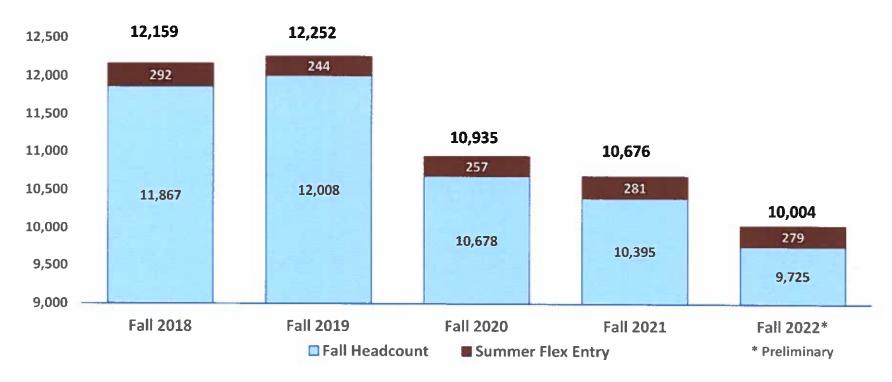

### **Spring Credit Headcount**



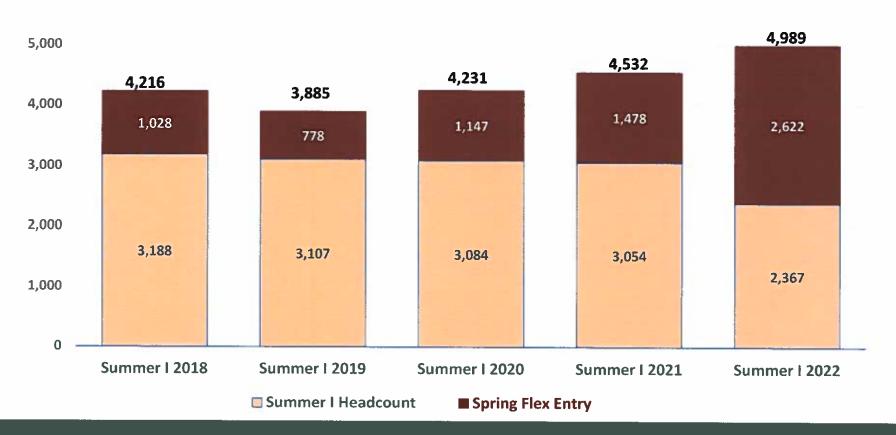


### **Fall Credit Headcount**

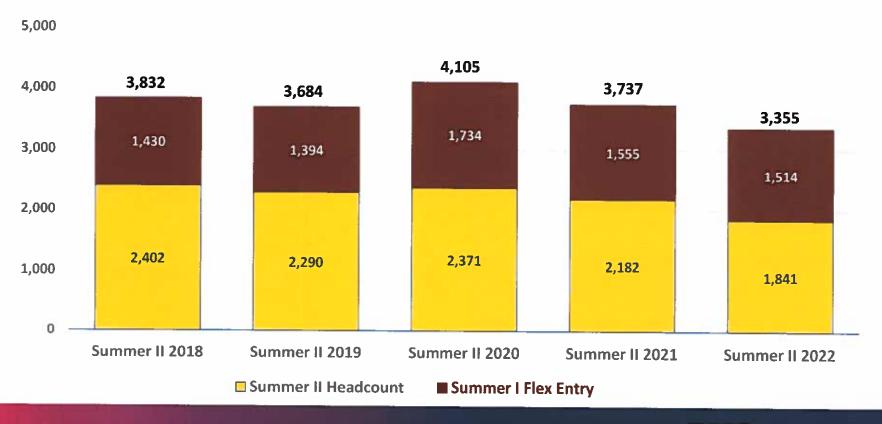

### **Summer II Credit Headcount**





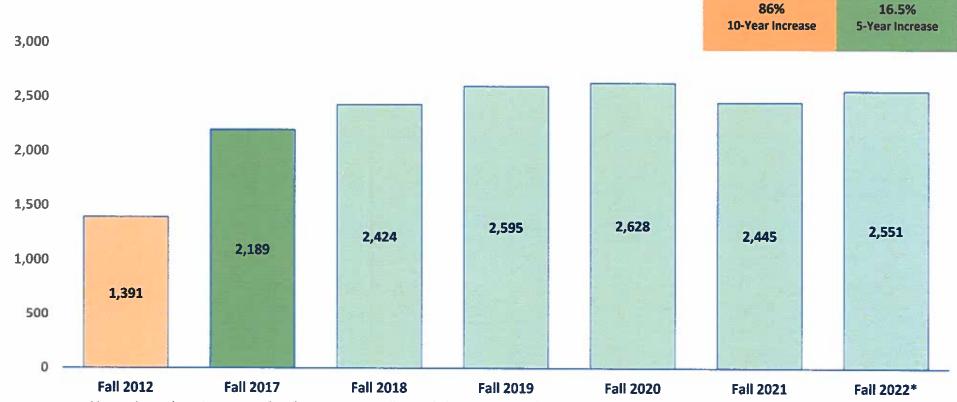
### **Credit Contact Hours**

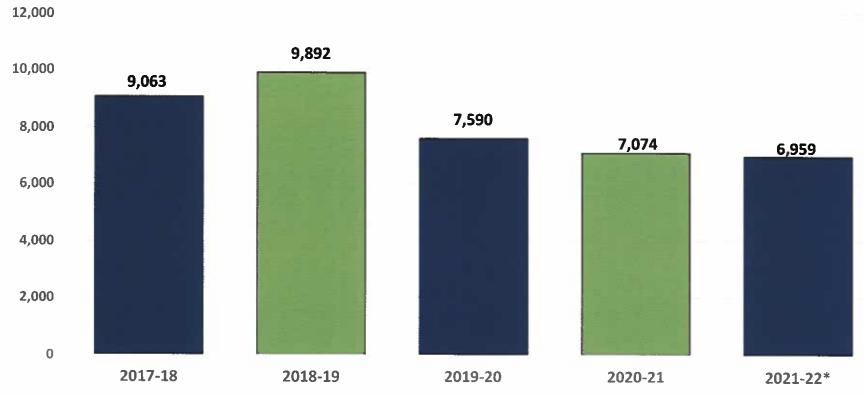
### **Fall Dual Credit Headcount**

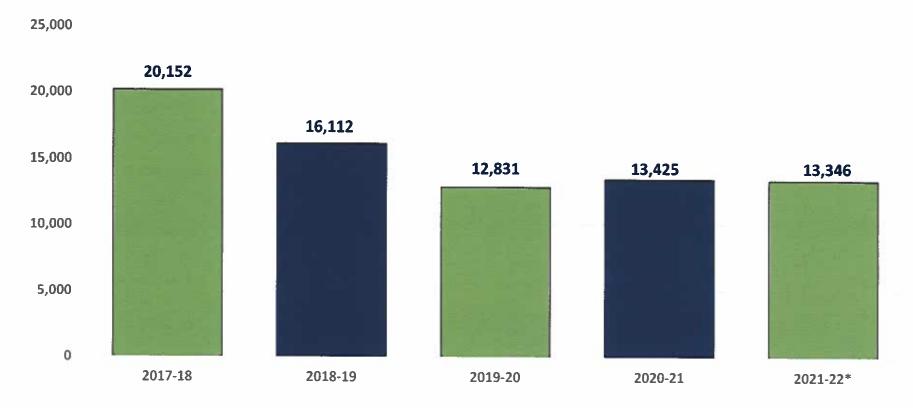
### **Continuing Education Annual Headcount**



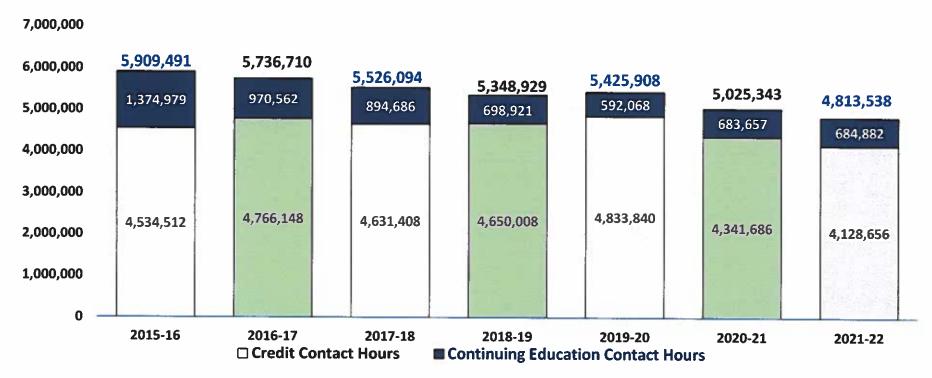

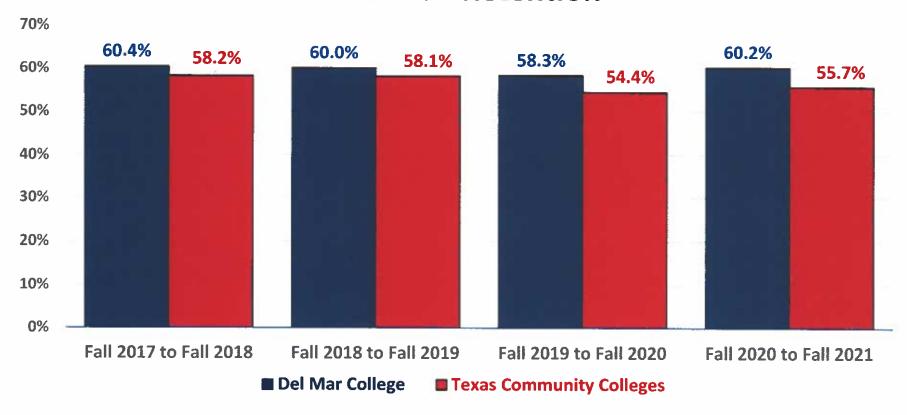

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the U.S. Department of Education (USDE) authorized accrediting agencies the flexibility to conduct virtual accreditation-related committee work, with an obligation to verify the findings with a subsequent on-site visit. Your institution has now completed the follow-up verification process. Thank you again for the hospitality and assistance extended for the Virtual Verification Follow-Up visit to your institution on October 2-5, 2022.

Enclosed is the report documenting the visit for the Substantive Change Committee. ## MINUTES OF THE WORKSHOP MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE DEL MAR COLLEGE DISTRICT

#### **September 13, 2022**

The Workshop Meeting of the Board of Regents of the Del Mar College District convened at the Center for Economic Development, 3209 S. Staples, Room 106, Corpus Christi, Texas, at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, September 13, 2022, with the following present:

#### From the Board:

Ms. Carol Scott, Dr. Nicholas Adame, Ms. Libby Averyt, Mr. Rudy Garza, Jr., and Dr. Linda Villarreal.

Mr. Ed Bennett appeared virtually.

#### From the College:

Dr. Mark Escamilla, President and CEO; Ms. Lenora Keas, Executive Vice President and COO; Mr. Raul Garcia, Vice President and CFO; Dr. Jonda Halcomb, Vice President and Chief Academic Officer; Ms. Tammy McDonald, Vice President of Administration and Human Resources; Ms. Patricia Benavides-Dominguez, Vice President for Student Affairs; Mr. Augustin Rivera, Jr., General Counsel; Mr. John Strybos, Vice President and Chief Physical Facilities Officer; Ms. Lorette Williams, Executive Director of Communication and Marketing; Ms. Mary McQueen, Executive Director of Development; Ms. Delia Perez, Director of CEO Office and Board Relations, and other staff and faculty.

#### CALL TO ORDER/QUORUM CALL

Ms. Scott called the meeting to order with a quorum present. She requested a moment of silence followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and Del Mar College Vision Statement.

**GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS** – The public was given the opportunity to provide public comments (both general and specific to any agenda item).

There were no public comments made for this meeting.

#### **ITEMS OF BUSINESS:**

Dr. Escamilla provided opening remarks and introduced Dr. Wilson. Dr. Wilson provided history and timeline of the College's Strategic Plan. She reviewed the differences between the Strategic Plan and the Operational Plan. The updates to the

current Plan is based on annual progress reports on strategy implementation; feedback from Board meeting discussions; discussions with the Executive Team; and feedback from the Strategic Planning Committee.

For College's Goal 2, Objective 7, a new objective titled Post-COVID Support will connect with, re-engage, and provide support to students who are impacted by the pandemic.

For the College's Goal 4, Objective 7, a new objective, Equity, will transform College practices to target and eliminate specific barriers to student success and address students' needs by centering equity within all practices.

For the College's Goal 1, Objective 5, Continuing Education has been updated to strengthen pathways from continuing education programs to credit programs and strengthen data collection and analysis processes of students enrolled in continuing education programs.

For the College's Goal 2, Objective 2, On-Boarding instructional supports has been updated to provide excellent instructional supports to aid in student's successful completion of coursework in all modalities.

For Goals 1 and 2, new strategies include Texas Transfer Framework and Students' Basic Needs. The Texas Transfer Framework will implement key components of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's (THECB) new guidance regarding transfer initiatives and the new strategy. The College is also embarking on a new initiative with the Hope Impact Partnerships organization to support student basic needs. The partnership will help us to address issues such as food and housing insecurity.

Two strategies have been completed which include redesign of the College's website to align with new student pathway structures and updated advising materials to promote on social media accounts and website platforms, and distribution of CARES Act Funding to students in need of support.

Dr. Wilson and Dr. Escamilla responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Wilson introduced Dr. Sydney Saumby, Director of Accreditation and Assessment. Dr. Saumby reviewed the launch of the new Strategic Plan for 2024-2029. There will be an 18-month development period beginning in January 2023 which will include the launch of a public webpage which will include the Strategic Planning Steering Committee, to include students, faculty and staff, community and Board members. The new Plan will be presented to the Board of Regents for approval in June of 2024.

Dr. Saumby reviewed the overall timeline which includes four different phases: Phase 1 – Planning; Phase 2 – Launch, Environmental Scan, Analysis; Phase 3 – Write, Refine, Present; and Phase 4 – Approve, Implement. She reviewed information regarding the

Steering Committee, student, faculty and staff, community, and Board engagement and how each will facilitate conversations about priorities and concerns for the College.

Dr. Carlos Garanzuay, Manager of Institutional Effectiveness and Assessment, discussed in more detail, key stakeholders which include Student Engagement and Faculty & Staff Engagement. Phase two which includes initial engagements are projected to include online surveys followed by face-to-face focus groups conducted from late spring through summer of 2023. Faculty and staff are critical to the strategic plan development process and will develop content for the 2023 summer academy. Progress and momentum of these steps will require the consistent advocacy of our internal councils.

Dr. Garanzuay, Dr. Wilson, and Dr. Escamilla responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Wilson discussed Key Performance Indicators which included Snapshot Reports, Student Achievement Reports, and Progress Reports. She highlighted the targets, thresholds, and trends of degrees and certificates awarded by credit programs that were disaggregated by gender, ethnicity and disadvantaged students.

Dr. Wilson and Dr. Escamilla responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Wilson reviewed the graduation rates for full-time and First-Time In College students for 2021. The College met its thresholds for the four-year and six-year graduation rates. It has already met the target for 2024 for the six-year graduation rate. The College fell short of our threshold for the three-year graduation rate.

Dr. Wilson, and Dr. Escamilla responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Wilson discussed time and semester credit hours to Associate's Degree which measures the average length of time in years and the average attempted semester credit hours to complete an Associate Degree. In 2021, the threshold of 5 years was met and the 2024 target will be 4.5 years. The semester credit hours to degree target for 2024 will be 83 semester credit hours.

Dr. Wilson, Ms. Benavides-Dominguez, Dr. Saumby, and Dr. Escamilla responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Wilson continued her presentation regarding transfers to a four-year institution and dual credit. In 2021, the threshold of 10% was met and the target for 2024 is 17%. The number of all students that transferred to a four-year institution for the years 2019-2020 was 1,929. For 2020-2021, dual credit students were successful with 160 (13.1%) of dual credit students earning a college degree or certificate at Del Mar College within one year of completing

high school. For 2021-2022, Continuing Education dual enrollment programs, 1,299 certifications were earned in courses such as Phlebotomy Technician, Electrocardiography Technician, Patient Care Technician, Basic Medical Assistant, and OSHA 30.

Dr. Wilson, Ms. Keas, and Dr. Escamilla responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Wilson began with the conclusion of the Workshop and discussed the next steps which include continuing to implement and monitor progress on 2019-2024 Strategic Plan; plan for a Spring 2023 launch of a new planning cycle; and onboard a Strategic Planning Steering Committee. Dr. Wilson stated the next Board Workshop for Strategic Planning will take place in Spring of 2023.

Mr. Rivera and Associate Vice President Sanders introduced the College's DEI initiave started by Dr. Escamilla. Mr. Rivera started by providing a historical overview of the education and advancement opportunities provided by Del Mar College in the community, with diversity being an integral part of the College's success and evolution. Mr. Rivera discussed the events surrounding the College voluntarily integrating the campus before *Brown v. Board of Education* legally required it and also established the Mexican American Studies program.

Ms. Sanders stated diversity and inclusion is one of the College's core values and the value statements are core principles that guide and direct the College and the culture. In consideration of the persistent issues of inequality in our society, the College recognizes the urgency for advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion in higher education.

As part of Del Mar College Board of Regents 2022 action plan, the Board of Regents is committed to supporting Dr. Escamilla in creating and adopting a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion plan and adopting a training policy, among other efforts, to ensure that Del Mar College is fair and inclusive and reflects the diversity of our community. This sets the tone for the importance of advancing in diversity, equity, and inclusion at the college.

Mr. Rivera reviewed actions that have been taken to date including reviewing DEI programming in other community colleges; Dr. Escamilla's appointment of a DEI Development Committee to begin a formal DEI assessment and study process which will be charged with formulating recommendations to be presented to the President. The Committee is representative of all DMC stakeholders and is co-chaired by Ms. Sanders and Mr. Rivera.

Ms. Sanders and Mr. Rivera responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Mr. Rivera concluded with review of the American Association of Community Colleges Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion: Framework for Action checklist.

At 11:48 a.m., the Chair announced that the Board was going into Closed Session.

#### **AGENDA**

#### CALL TO ORDER QUORUM CALL

Ms. Scott called the meeting to order with a quorum present, she requested a moment of silence followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and Del Mar College Vision Statement.

**GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS** – The public was given the opportunity to provide public comments (both general and specific to any agenda item).

There were no public comments made for this meeting.

#### **RECOGNITIONS:**

Ms. Tammy McDonald stated the Young Business Professionals of the Coastal Bend organization created the Corpus Christi under 40 recognition to not only recognize

outstanding Corpus Christi citizens, but also those that have the betterment for the community. The CCU40 is an event that honors accomplishments of those who are under 40 years of age, who have made significant contributions to their professional fields, as well as through service in the community. The College is very proud to recognize the following employees: Class of 2020, Jason Houlihan and Newman Wong. Class of 2021, Sara King; and Class of 2022, Leticia Wilson and Kelsey Chopelas. Chair Scott congratulated the employees and stated they were an asset to the College.

#### 

• Retention Services Academic Recovery Program (Goal 2: Retention and Persistence)

Ms. Benavides-Dominguez reviewed the Retention Services Academic Recovery Program (ARP) which includes an Alert Program; Academic Recovery Program (ARP); and Referrals. Retention Services work individually with students on academic challenges, overcoming barriers, decision-making, and assistance with financial aid appeal process.

Also, academic support is provided through, but not limited to learning centers, tutoring, accommodations based on ability, the technology resource center within the student success center. Social support is offered through Clubs, organizations, volunteering leadership opportunities through Student Leadership and Campus Life. Various personnel and other support are provided through the career development office, mental health counseling, the Viking food pantry, and connect with many community resources.

Ms. Benavides-Dominguez reviewed comparisons from the Retention Services Department and the Academic Recovery Program for 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 academic years. The Retention Services office met its target goals with the increase from one year to the next, 35 to 41% of the students obtaining good scholastic standing and 61 to 67% of students increasing their cumulative GPA.

During the 2021-2022 academic year, 78% of the students that met or worked with the retention case managers, registered for the following semester.

Ms. Benavides-Dominguez concluded stating intentional efforts of the retention case managers continues to play a critical role in student persistence at Del Mar College, by helping struggling students get back on track and integrate themselves as active integral members of the campus.

Ms. Benavides-Dominguez responded to input and questions from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Escamilla began his report stating the 2021-2022 Statistical Profile was provided to Regents and contains important data points and information, datasets, endpoints of information that guides

the College and supports its trajectory.

Dr. Escamilla also provided an update regarding the Oso Creek Campus stating although construction is not complete, instruction began on June 11, 2022 and then again on August 29, 2022. Preliminary enrollment numbers are at 2,189, and they continue to enroll the second eight weeks which begins on October 24, 2022. Dr. Escamilla invited the Board to go by and see the progress made at the Oso Creek Campus.

#### STAFF REPORTS:

Mr. Garcia stated in accordance with the College Write-Off and Default Board Policy, B4.20 delinquent accounts are written off after the College has made multiple collection attempts. This report is regarding 2022 student receivable write-off valued at \$287, 122.00.

Mr. John Johnson provided further details regarding bad debt write-offs and holds placed on a student's record, preventing them from re-enrolling or receiving transcripts until the balance is paid. The two mandated federal and state programs represent 92.99% of the total amount written off or \$252,000. The remaining 7% of write-offs are due to a number of different reasons. Write-offs for the current year, represent less than 1% of total tuition and fees collected.

Dr. Halcomb stated the faculty chairs and deans continually review programs through advisory meetings and annual inspections for continued need and demand. Due to declining enrollment or majors, or change in the workforce needs, the Academic Dean and the Curriculum Committee makes determination to deactivate the following:

From the Business Administration and Entrepreneurship Department: 1) Production and Logistics Management Specialization: Associate of Applied Science; 2) Management: Logistics and Supply Chain Management: Level I Certificate; and 3) Supply Chain Management: Occupational Skills Award.

From the Architecture, Automotive and Aviation Department: 1) Carpentry: Associate of Applied Science; Carpenter I: Level I Certificate; Carpenter II: Level II Certificate; and Basic Carpentry: Occupational Skills Award.

From the Architecture, Automotive and Aviation Department: 1) Professional Electronics: Avionics Electronics Technology Specialty: Associate of Applied Science; and 2) Professional Electronics: Avionics Tech II-Level II Certificate.

Dr. Halcomb reviewed the steps of deactivation of these programs including program rational, and next steps including notification to SACSCOC and THECB; removal from the College's publications; and migrating students to other programs in similar fields.

Dr. Halcomb, Ms. Jennifer Sramek, Dr. Leonard Rivera, and Mr. Davis Merrill responded to questions from the Board of Regents.

#### REGULAR AGENDA

#### (Goal 5: Workforce Development, Community Partnerships, and Advocacy)

Ms. McDonald reviewed the Order to Call the 2022 Board of Regents General Election. Election packets were made available from July 25, 2022 through August 22, 2022. Ms. Jessica Alaniz, Election Administrator, received and verified the applications received from Mr. David Loeb for District II, and Mr. Carl Crull and Ms. Libby Averyt for At-Large. No other applications or write-in declarations were received. The Texas Election Code allows cancellation of an election if candidates run unopposed in single-member and at-large district races.

A Certification of Unopposed Candidates for Del Mar College Board of Regent's General Election for the November 8th, 2022 is being presented today and has been certified by Jessica Alaniz, College Election Administrator, which states the candidates are unopposed for office and for the College to declare such candidates as elected. Upon declaring the candidates elected, the Board of Regents must begin steps to cancel the general election. Candidates that have been declared elected may not take office until after the canvassing date, which is tentatively scheduled for November 18th.

Regent Adame made a motion to approve the certification of unopposed candidates and the order of cancellation for the 2022 Board of Regents General Election as presented. Regent Garza seconded the motion. There was no further discussion from the Board. There were no public comments. A vote was taken by show of hands and the motion carried unanimously 6-0, amongst Regents present, with Regents Scott, Adame, Bennett, Garza, Turner, and Villarreal in favor, and one abstention by Regent Averyt.

Mr. Rivera provided a summary of the appointment of Del Mar College representative to the Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ) #5 Board. Mr. Rivera stated Regent Averyt is currently serving and with her term expiring on October 12, 2022. Regent Averyt confirmed her willingness to serve on the Board of TIRZ #5.

Regent Garza made a motion to reappoint Regent Libby Averyt as Representative for Del Mar College to the TIRZ #5 Board as presented. Regent Turner seconded the motion. There was no further discussion from the Board. There were no public comments. A vote was taken by show of hands and the motion carried unanimously 6-0, amongst Regents present, with Regents Scott, Adame, Bennett, Garza, Turner, and Villarreal in favor, and one abstention by Regent Averyt.

Mr. Strybos provided a summary of the award of Request for Proposals RFP #2022-09, Custodial Services. He also reviewed the categories of points awarded and stated there were nine different respondents. The recommended award is to ABM Industries at an annual price of \$1,454,634.72 for a two-year contract with options for three, one-year renewals.

Regent Garza made a motion to award the custodial services contract to ABM Industries as presented. Regent Turner seconded the motion. There were no public comments. A vote was taken by show of hands and the motion carried unanimously 7-0, amongst Regents present, with Regents Scott, Adame, Averyt, Bennett, Garza, Turner, and Villarreal in favor.

Mr. Strybos provided information regarding approval of 2016 Oso Creek Campus project Change Order #11. The Change Order is to address the scope of work that resulted from additional work including 1) architect's supplemental information; 2) request for information responses issued by the architect; 3) bulletin issued by the architect; 4) extended general conditions; 5) parking lot security camera fiber and power; and 6) unforeseen sight conditions. Mr. Strybos stated the campus will be ready and open in January 2023. The total is \$2.9 million for Change Order #11.

Mr. Strybos responded to questions from the Board of Regents.

#### **AGENDA**

#### CALL TO ORDER QUORUM CALL

Ms. Hutchinson called the meeting to order with a quorum present. She requested a moment of silence followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and Del Mar College Vision Statement.

**GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS** – The public was given the opportunity to provide public comments (both general and specific to any agenda item).

There were no public comments made for this meeting.

#### **RECOGNITIONS:**

Dr. Shao-Shan Chen and Dr. David Sutanto traveled to France to perform this summer. They were invited by several high-level individuals within the Corpus Christi community and from the city they performed in. Drs. Chen and Sutanto, Professors of Music, had the honor

performing at the Théâtre Municipal Ducourneau in Agen, France on May 26, 2022. The event was sponsored by the Sister City Committee from the City of Corpus Christi as part of the cultural exchange program. Dr. Halcomb provided information regarding the awards and recognitions of Drs. Chen and Sutanto. Drs. Chen and Sutanto provided words of gratitude for the opportunity to accept the invitation from the Sister City Committee and promote Del Mar College. Chair of the Sister City Committee, Melody Cooper, provided words of praise stating Dr. Chen and Dr. Sutanto performed to a packed house and did a masterful job.

 Dr. Angelica Gomez-Johnson, Curriculum Manager, Planning and Institutional Effectiveness appointed to the THECB Texas Transfer Advisory Committee.......Dr. Jonda Halcomb (Goal 1: Completion)

Dr. Halcomb stated Dr. Angelica Gomez-Johnson was appointed by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) to serve on the Texas Transfer Advisory Committee. The committee advises the Commissioner on the Texas Transfer Frameworks project. Dr. Gomez-Johnson will aid in the development of the Texas transfer field of study curriculum for discipline specific courses and directed electives. Dr. Gomez-Johnson is the College's Curriculum Manager of Planning and Institutional Effectiveness. Ms. Hutchinson provided words of thanks to Dr. Gomez-Johnson. Dr. Gomez-Johnson stated her appreciation for the support and kind words.

#### 

Dental Programs

(Goal 3: Academic Preparedness and Student Learning)

Dr. Halcomb provided highlights regarding the Dental Program and stated that the College's dental programs are accredited by the Commission on Dental Accreditation, also called CODA. Dr. Halcomb stated the Innovative Readiness Training Nueces 2022 Operation Health and Wellness, faculty and students provide no cost dental services to the community. Students promote the importance of oral health care and gave free toothbrushes and toothpaste at the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual KEDT Kids Festival. Also, at the DMC Dental Hygiene Clinic, students provide oral cancer screenings, fluoride applications, intraoral examination, teeth cleaning, dental sealants, medical history, blood pressure screening, periodontal assessments, and periodontal therapy and X-rays.

In 2020-2021, dental students served 547 patients and in 2021-2022, served 725 patients at a no-fee cost of \$760,000.00. For 2021-2022, 100% of the Dental Assisting students passed the certification written exam, dental hygiene licensure written exam, on the second try, 91%. The dental hygiene clinical exam, pass rate for 2020-2021 was 100% on the first attempt; and 2021-2022, 95% on the second attempt. Dr. Halcomb congratulated the dental students and Assistant Professor and Program Director of Dental Programs, Eva Sepulveda. Ms. Sepulveda expressed words of gratitude.

• CEO Report to the Board, Title IX/SB212 Annual Report (Goal 4: Learning Environments)

Dr. Escamilla stated under Texas Education Code section 51.253c, the institution's CEO submits a report to the governing body once during each fall or spring semester concerning sexual misconduct reports received by employees under Texas Education Code Section 51.252. For the purpose of compliance, a submitted summary report includes all required reporting information for the period of September 1, 2021 through August 31, 2022 and the summary is posted on the College's website and Certificate of Compliance will be submitted to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

- Texas Association of Community Colleges (TACC) Quarterly Meeting, October 19, 2022 (Goal 5: Workforce Development, Community Partnerships, and Advocacy)
- Texas Commission on Community College Funding (TXCCCF) Finalization (Goal 5: Workforce Development, Community Partnerships, and Advocacy)

Dr. Escamilla reported that the Commission is finalizing the report to be submitted just before the 88<sup>th</sup> Legislature begins in January 2023. if adopted, the proposal will change the way the State of Texas funds all aspects of community college finances. Their recommendations focus on outcome funding, affordability for students, and investment in building college capacity, especially in smaller institutions. They are proposing to the legislature that they adopt funding model that accounts for the higher costs associated with effective and high demand career fields throughout the community college instruction. The Commission is working on implementing an ongoing program that encourages and supports community colleges in the way of public partnerships.

Dr. Escamilla stated he has worked with the Commission of Higher Education and Appointee, Dr. Harrison Keller, his staff and the appointed Chair, Woody Hunt of El Paso. He confirmed that the invitation to visit was accepted a regional meeting of Presidents from Alamo South and Trustees in Corpus Christi will be held at Del Mar College to talk about the purpose of the Commission and next steps in preparation for the 88th Legislature.

#### STAFF REPORTS:

Ms. McDonald stated that the 2022 Annual Security and Safety Report for Del Mar College has been distributed. The report is prepared annually in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, known as the Clery Act. The Committee included Tammy McDonald, Lauren White, Lenora Keas, Cheryl Sanders, Rita Hernandez, Chris Tweedle, Jessica Alaniz, and Augustin Rivera, Jr.

Chief White stated that for Del Mar College to be in compliance, all post-secondary institutions participating in Title IV student financial assistance programs must disclose crime statistics and security information to students and the public by October 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. She pointed out that the majority of crimes listed do not involve students or employees.

Chief White responded to questions from the Board of Regents.

Dr. Halcomb read a Resolution

Regular Meeting October 11, 2022 recognizing Mr. Mac Aipperspach who provided 37 years of service to the College in the Radio/Television Program. Regent Hutchinson thanked him for his service and inspiration. Mr. Aipperspach provided words of gratitude and appreciation.

Regent Garza made a motion to accept the nomination of Professor Emeritus for Mr. Mac Aipperspach as presented. Regent Averyt seconded the motion. There was no further discussion from the Board. One public comment was made. A voice vote was taken and the motion carried unanimously 6-0, amongst Regents present, with Regents Adame, Averyt, Bennett, Garza, Hutchinson, and Kelly in favor.

Dr. Halcomb stated in accordance with Board Policy B5.33, Faculty Council received requests to consider Professor Emeritus status which is a distinction that is reserved for those faculty who have shown distinguished service, significant contributions to higher education, meritorious teaching, and special honors. Dr. Halcomb read a Resolution recognizing Dr. Judi Phillips, a faculty member for 35 years, and Chair of the Department of Kinesiology and Education for 7 years. Regent Hutchinson thanked her for her service and inspiration. Dr. Phillips provided words of gratitude and appreciation.

Regent Kelly made a motion to accept the nomination of Professor Emeritus for Dr. Judi Phillips as presented. Regent Averyt seconded the motion. There was no further discussion from the Board. No public comments were made. A voice vote was taken and the motion carried unanimously 6-0, amongst Regents present, with Regents Adame, Averyt, Bennett, Garza, Hutchinson, and Kelly in favor.

Dr. Halcomb stated in accordance with Board Policy B5.33, the Faculty Council received requests to consider Professor Emeritus status which is a distinction that is reserved for those faculty who have shown distinguished service, significant contributions to higher education, meritorious teaching, and special honors. Dr. Halcomb read a Resolution recognizing Mr. David Hattox, a faculty member for 19 years and Chair for 7 years in the Computer Science, Engineering and Advanced Technology Department. Regent Hutchinson thanked him for his service and inspiration. Mr. Hattox provided words of

gratitude and appreciation.

Regent Averyt made a motion to accept the nomination of Professor Emeritus for Mr. David Hattox as presented. Regent Garza seconded the motion. There was no further discussion from the Board. No public comments were made. A voice vote was taken and the motion carried unanimously 6-0, amongst Regents present, with Regents Adame, Averyt, Bennett, Garza, Hutchinson, and Kelly in favor.

Mr. Garcia introduced Mr. Dave McElwain from Patterson and Associates to discuss the College's investment performance and strategies in pursuit of higher yields.

Mr. McElwain began his presentation and discussed inflation and how the Federal Reserve's primary goal is to tame it. There was a strong employment report in August reinforced by the assessment of a solid labor market. Personal income is rising but, so is spending. Real income has now fallen for the fifth straight month.

A year ago, in September, two-year treasury yield was 0.2%, now it's at 4.2%, a full 4% increase. The College's portfolio as of August 31<sup>st</sup>, the weighted average yield was 386 days, which was 1.06 years. Weighted average yield of all the funds combined was 0.867%. Also, 52% of all the cash is domiciled in the local maintenance account which is almost 25% of the portfolio is in cash, money markets, and investment pools. Then the College has 15% of the portfolio with very short-term maturities, or under a year. Funds from the 2018 Tax Bond B have been totally expended. The market value of the portfolio again is almost \$91.5 million at the end of the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter versus last 4<sup>th</sup> quarter which was at 94.4 million. The weighted average maturity of these non-construction funds is 230 days, and it was about 275 days last year. The total net earnings for 4<sup>th</sup> quarter was \$312,000.00 and for the year, net earnings of the portfolio, excluding your bond funds, was \$594,000.00.

Mr. McElwain responded to questions from Dr. Escamilla.

Regent Averyt made a motion to accept and approve the Quarterly Investment Report for period ending August 31, 2022 as presented. Regent Garza seconded the motion. There was no further discussion from the Board. No public comments were made. A voice vote was taken and the motion carried unanimously 6-0, amongst Regents present,

with Regents Adame, Averyt, Bennett, Garza, Hutchinson, and Kelly in favor.

Mr. Garcia stated that the College has continued to operate within its planned budget limits with a reported financial surplus for this month of \$1.2 million despite current financial conditions. Total State funding revenues for FY 2022 are \$23.1 million, in addition to other revenues, the total \$87.7 million. Total expenditures total \$110.9 million with \$1.1 million current net funds available for operations. The College has also experienced reduced spending in non-salary expense and contingency categories with a combined value of \$823,000, which is contributing to the current surplus of \$1.2 million. The College has sufficient liquidity to pay its current obligations valued at approximately \$34.4 million.

Regent Kelly made a motion to accept and approve the Quarterly Financial Report for period ending August 31, 2022 as presented. Regent Averyt seconded the motion. There was no further discussion from the Board. No public comments were made. A voice vote was taken and the motion carried unanimously 6-0, amongst Regents present, with Regents Adame, Averyt, Bennett, Garza, Hutchinson, and Kelly in favor.

Item No. 6 was moved up in the agenda during the Board of Regents meeting.

Ms. McDonald stated that as part of the internal audit process, the Board of Regent's Audit Committee met on September 29, 2022. Daniel Graves and Brandon Tanous, partners with Weaver were present and will review the internal audit status and report information.

Mr. Tanous stated the audit procedures are still in progress and they are wrapping up field work this week with purchasing management. The scope of the audit will include evaluation of risk and internal controls and is in place regarding the Colleges purchasing cycle. After stating the internal audits follow-up from previous years (2015, 2018, and 2019) were closed, Mr. Tanous continued providing the Board with audit information regarding construction management. After completion of audit fieldwork on September 8, 2022, the report received an unsatisfactory rating which covered November 1, 2020

through April 30, 2022. Included in the evaluation were Master Development Plan; Request for Proposals and Awards; Construction Plan Approval and Contract; Construction Project Management; Construction in Progress Insurance Binders; Construction Warranties and Bonds; and Accounting for Construction Projects. Unsatisfactory rating was for the following: Construction Management issues which included standard operating procedures; construction file maintenance and documentation; change order requests; insurance certificate monitoring; construction bonds; payment authorization; operation and maintenance document transfer; and incomplete contract.

Dr. Escamilla provided commentary regarding improvements to the College's processes.

Mr. Strybos, Mr. Tanous and Mr. Graves responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Mr. Graves discussed Management's response to findings and committed development standard to operating procedures.

Mr. Tanous and Mr. Graves responded to questions and input from the Board of Regents.

Mr. Graves continued with Annual Internal Audit Report which is due to state oversight agencies and posted on Del Mar College's website by November 1, 2022. The report format is prescribed by the State Auditor's Office and includes the following required sections: Compliance with Texas Government Code 2102.015; Internal Audit Plan for Fiscal Year 2021; Consulting Services and Non-audit Services Completed; External Quality Assurance Review; Internal Audit Plan for Fiscal Year 2022; External Audit services performed for the College; and Reporting Suspected Fraud and Abuse.

At 2:39 p.m., the Chair announced that the Board was going into Closed Session.
